“*Xenopsylla nesiotes*”. A CORRECTION.—In a previous number of this Journal (*Rec. Ind. Mus.*, Vol. VI, p. 43, 1911) I published a small paper on fleas sent to me for identification by the Indian Museum, and among them I mentioned *Xenopsylla nesiotes*. I regret to mention that this identification was incorrect; the specimens I called *Xenopsylla nesiotes* are really *Xenopsylla astia* (see *Novitates Zoologicae*, Vol. XVIII, p. 117, 1911).
